BLACK CATHOLIC YOUTH LEADERSHIP RETREAT

Each year the Diocese of Louisville, KY sponsors this retreat under the leadership of Deacon Turner and Mrs. Annette Turner. The process is designed to help Black Catholic Youth develop leadership skills by learning more about their culture, faith and history. High School students are challenged with exploring their values and purpose in becoming followers of Christ charged with spreading the Good News within their homes, schools, parishes, and communities.

This year Kujenga was held at Mt. St. Francis Center for Spirituality in Indiana on July 18-20, 2025. Sr. Jane Nesmith was able to take twelve youth and two chaperones from the Diocese of Cleveland to participate in the retreat.

We participated in team building activities to help build trust, strategic planning, deep conversation on accountability and unity in a positive and nurturing atmosphere. Students enjoyed the challenge of working together with different scenarios as a family. Each family represented one of the values of the Nugo Saga. An open forum enabled them to share their views about "Why there is so little youth participation in their parish communities and what can be done to turn this around?"

How significant or providential it is that we were able to find twelve youth who could be available to the process which we hope to become a life-changing experience they were able to share with their peers and their respective parish communities. Perhaps we can gather more youth from around the Diocese to attend Kugenga Viongozi 2026 by hosting it here in the Diocese of Cleveland.
