





Newman Campus Ministry member, Caleb Palagyi gave the following Valedictory Address at the Cleveland State University 2022 Commencement.

Since we began our time, here, at Cleveland State University, each of us has made countless journeys to and from our campus, none of which would have been possible without bridges. The Innerbelt Bridge, the Valley View Bridge, and the Detroit Superior Bridge -- many of Cleveland's bridges are the only means by which we could make our trek to campus. These bridges were built by someone who decided that the journey must be made easier for the next traveler; a decision made only after facing the same difficult path, reaching the destination, and then choosing to turn around to help others who came after.

Each of us here finds ourselves in the same situation; we have overcome numerous obstacles during our college journey, and we are just moments away from the destination—life after graduation. This leaves us with a decision, "Will I turn back and build a bridge for another?"

The easy choice is to focus on oneself and to just keep trying to make it across the next seemingly impassable path to the next destination. For some of us, that may be graduate programs, for others - entering the workforce; these future decisions come with new sets of challenges. Most of us have been told at least once to keep moving forward and eventually all of these difficulties will be in the rearview mirror and you can forget about them, right? Not quite. I ask that you take the time to step back, reflect and look behind you.

You will find that there are more than just the vestiges of the struggles you overcame, but people who are grappling with the same exact challenges you faced. You'll see your friends, your siblings, maybe even your children, fighting the same battles you did. And just like you, they are searching for a guide who has the knowledge that one <u>only</u> acquires by overcoming hardships, who builds bridges for others, and who out of generosity empowers all coming after them to fearlessly face the next challenge. Graduating from Cleveland State has given us the opportunity to be that helping hand to those in need.

Some people here today have already taken that first step to mentoring the traveler behind them – by student teaching in local schools, engaging clients in music therapy, or working as a tutor in the Writing or Math Learning Center. Or maybe, it was as simple as going home and helping a sibling, a neighbor, son, or daughter with that homework problem that just seemed too hard until you explained it in a new way.

As Saint Teresa of Calcutta said, "Never worry about the numbers. Help one person at a time and always start with the person nearest you." No matter how small that first step might have been, it made that person's journey just that much easier. (2:25)

Many of my bridge builders are here today. Thank you to my parents, family, and girlfriend for their support and patience, and for reminding me that there is more to life thank you to the priests and teachers at Saint Ignatius High School who showed me that "a Saint Ignatius education exists not to make you BETTER THAN everyone else, but to make you better FOR everyone else." And to my high school Science Olympiad coaches and to CSU's Newman Catholic Campus Ministry for "giving me the tools to answer the question, 'What does God want for me?'" and for forming me into the engineer I am today and the teacher I hope to become in the future. Lastly, thank you to my CSU Washkewicz College of Engineering professors, Mr. Rarick, and Drs. Dong, Gao, Chu, and Stankovic for making "Engaged Learning" not just a tagline, but an authentic, tangible experience over the last four years.

Class of 2022, as you sit anxiously waiting to walk across this stage today, take the time to reflect on who your bridge builders have been. Think about who has helped form you into the person you are now. And after you leave here today, having finally earned what we all have worked so hard to achieve, go out into the world and thank those bridgebuilders in your life and strive to become a bridge builder yourself.

CWRU Labre Completes 35 Runs

CWRU Labre is a homeless outreach ministry at Case Western Reserve University. A student-run volunteer organization that drives around Cleveland on Monday nights, delivering food to the unhoused. Students say that the program is about more than just food. "It's about the relationships we forge during the nights of service." The typical year is two 15 week semesters. Students exceeded one run per week, taking food to the unhoused a total of 35 times this year.

University of Akron

- 180 attended the the annual Ash Wednesday Mass and pizza dinner.

Ashland University

- Newman Campus Ministry hosted 24 in-person Newman Nights featuring personal witnesses from students.
- 16 students participated in Rooted: Freshmen & Sophomore Day of Reflection in the fall.
- 14 students participated in Uprooted: Junior & Senior Day of Reflection

Baldwin Wallace University

- Student led Bible Study was introduced and had small-group success
- Newman night topics included student witnesses or presentations on Missionary Discipleship: The Joy of the Gospel, What Catholics Believe: Catechism 101 and Praying with Mary in Advent.
- Students increased community service through partnerships with the Circle K Club on a blanket-making event and with St. Adalbert by serving at the Lenten fish fries.



Case Western Reserve University

- Student Led Labre Project service program received "Best Community Service Organization" award from Case.
- Began working with Evangelical Catholic to assist with formation of student leaders with 10 students entering the process.
- Lenten Rosary began after Newman Night, with 15 to 20 students staying to pray together, and continued after Lent.

Cleveland State University

- Two students completed the Rites of Christian Initiation on Holy Saturday.
- Newman student awarded Valedictorian and included Newman in his valedictory address.
- Students participated in weekly Bible Study, reflecting on the upcoming Sunday readings.

College of Wooster

- Students lobbied College of Wooster for a distinctly Catholic space through student petition drive. College is considering their request.
- Students worked with Campus Minister to plan ecumenical Ash Wednesday prayer service.
- Students planned and led service projects with the Oberlin Community Garden and with the Soup and Bread Project.

Oberlin College

- After relaxed COVID protocols, Sunday Mass returned to campus..
- Students welcomed a new chaplain, Fr. James Winings.
- Newman students planned and hosted an Advent Lessons and Carols program for the Oberlin community and followed that with Mass and a meal.

Thanks to the generous support of the Newman Foundation these things and more were provided on our seven college campuses.

- Students from Cleveland State, Case Western Reserve and Baldwin Wallace Universities were all able to participate in Busy Student Retreats.
- Cleveland State University and College of Wooster ministries purchased video conferencing equipment so that students can participate in virtual speaker series and SEEK conference.
- College of Wooster and Oberlin College ministries were able to provide copies of "Being Christian" (Williams), and "Christ Divided" (Walker-Grimes) so that students could participate in book studies according to where they are on their faith journey.
- The Director for Newman Campus Ministry and three Campus Ministers produced the second annual Advent Reflection Booklet.
- Ashland University ministry provided a First Year Student Initiative providing social activities, small group faith sharing, and fall retreat experience.
