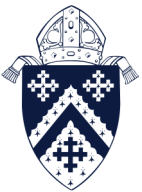

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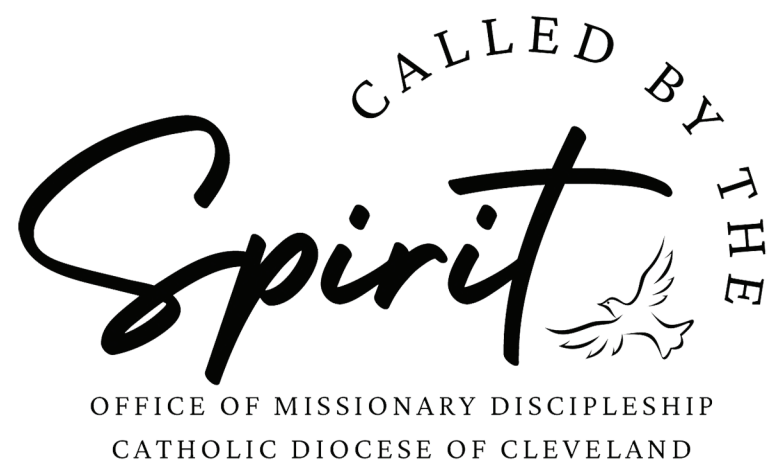
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Now What?

After you complete the inventory, you will have some foundational information that can help aid your own prayer, discernment, focus and activity in your parish and the wider community. Understanding that we are all on a journey of faith, this information can be used to determine a fruitful and enriching path forward collaborating with others and encountering Christ. Once you complete the inventory, we encourage you to:

- Pray about your charisms and learn more about how these are lived out.
- Use the Gospel of Mark Reflection Journal to continue to meditate on God’s action throughout your life.
- Research the saints and learn how some of their gifts resonate with your own charisms. Each of the descriptions of the gifts have a recommended patron saint to research and pray with.
- Connect with a small discernment group, prayer mentor, or spiritual director for continued discernment. Learn how others witness you using your gifts and pray on those testimonies to encounter further nudging of the Holy Spirit in your life.
- Work with a pastoral associate or volunteer coordinator to understand the needs in your parish and community to determine how you may use your gifts to respond to or enhance parish activities.

As St. Paul says many times in his letters to the early Christians, “May the Spirit of the Lord be with you!”

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Introduction

God, by his sheer grace, draws us to himself and makes us one with him. He sends his Spirit into our hearts to make us his children, transforming us and enabling us to respond to his love by our lives. (Evangelii Gaudium, 112).

As missionary disciples, each of us is called by virtue of our baptism to respond to and cooperate with God’s grace in the world. This grace is both life-giving and sustaining, fulfilling every aching heart that yearns for more. We are uniquely made in God’s image and likeness to reveal in our own response to grace, the immensity of his love for us and all creation. Being made in God’s creative image and likeness (Genesis 1), we seek, with wonderment and awe, the revelation of God intimately with us through the Holy Spirit. Through this life-long process of discernment, God reveals our role in his great plan and invites an active response that offers our restless hearts purpose and meaning.

A Life-long Process of Discernment and Discovery

The process of discernment is life-long and requires consistent engagement, prayerful focus, and nurturing spiritual mentoring. As experiences and circumstances shape the needs that exist in a community, the Holy Spirit will empower the graces needed to respond. It is the charge of the faithful to stir up those graces in their lives.

Furthermore, discernment:

- Leads us to freely align with God’s heart and will, and collaborate with grace;
- Is a continual process of seeking, discovery, and awareness that involves intentional and focused listening with the heart;
- Places us in the disquieting presence of God and the ennobling sacredness of the other;
- Requires a confrontation with the illusions that sometimes easily possess us;
- Requires an intentional sacred silence and encounter – we place ourselves in the presence of the Holy Spirit;
- Is a form of worship that must lead to action

As Missionary Disciples, discernment must continually be a part of our daily regimen. Let this inventory be a spring board for conversation and dialogue, prayer and meditation, and recognition of the Holy Spirit animating your life and challenging you to more deeply encounter the love of Christ within your life.

The Called by the Spirit Discernment Inventory is a tool that can be used and adapted by individuals and groups to identify the gifts with which they have been graced, so that they can begin to discern how to best use those gifts to bring about God’s kingdom. It is intended to provide the foundation for enriching conversation, prayer, and spiritual direction that can yield much fruit in the Holy Spirit.

On behalf of the Catholic Diocese of Cleveland Called by the Spirit team, I hope and pray that these resources can be helpful to you in your own prayerful discernment.

Throughout this resource the words/phrases are used interchangeably to refer to the Gifts of the Holy Spirit:

- Graces
- Spiritual Gifts
- Charisms



God’s Plan Revealed in Your Gifts

God is Communicating Through Your Gifts

There are so many needs in the world. We often complain, “Why doesn’t someone do something?!”The Church challenges all faithful to discern their gifts, endowed by the Holy Spirit, and use those to better the lives of others and bring about God’s reign. The recognition of many needs, and the nurturing of disciples to respond to those needs, is exactly why we have developed ministries. Parishes however, struggle to find new volunteers, engage parishioners in a meaningful way, or develop a deeper spirituality for their parishioners. The sad news is that only 7% of Catholics actively participate in parish activities. The Good News is that the Holy Spirit is not ready to quit!

Out of a sense of humility, it is common for Catholics to underestimate their own gifts. Yet we readily recognize the gifts of others. There are so many talents and abilities in any parish community that they are more numerous than the stars of the night. Through an inventory questionnaire, we can not only identify our own gifts, but even come to a deeper relationship with Christ. We can learn to hear God’s plan for us and respond to a personal invitation to participate in this great moment in history.

This is the time for us to re-imagine how we all can help reshape the parish, its ministries, and ourselves into more authentic and enthusiastic disciples. Get ready to let the Holy Spirit reveal something surprising about who you are! “Come see a man who told me everything I have done. Could he possibly be the Messiah?” (John 4:29). God wants to reshape the way we live Church, and is asking for your help. “Come away by yourselves to a deserted place and rest for a while” (Mark 6:31).

You Are Called

After Simon Peter realized the miracle of the abundant catch of fish, “he fell to the knees of Jesus and said, ‘Depart from me, Lord, for I am a sinful man.’” “Jesus said to Simon, ‘Do not be afraid; from now on you will be catching men’” (Luke 5: 8, 10).

Just as St. Peter was called, we, too, are called to bring people to Christ. When God calls us, we call it a “**vocation**.” In the Church we can distinguish between three types of vocations. Each type involves intentional collaboration with the Holy Spirit, prayerful discernment, and action.

First, by virtue of our Baptism, each of us is called to serve God by making disciples, teaching them the good news of the Gospel, and drawing them to encounters with Christ (cf. Matthew 28). This is the foundational Christian vocation: “to holiness and the mission of evangelizing the world” (Catechism of the Catholic Church, par. 1533).

Second, God calls each of us to a particular state of life that fulfills us, nurtures, sustains, and builds up the Church. These vocations include vowed religious life, single life, married life, and ordained life. In these states of life, we uniquely encounter fulfillment and freedom in Christ and life in the Church.

Thirdly, we can distinguish personal vocation callings that draw us to action in the Holy Spirit, bringing us closer to Christ. These could include teaching, serving the poor, witnessing to Christ by lived example, prayerful study, missionary work, mentoring, bible studies, the arts, volunteering, and many, many more actions.



Discernment of Gifts and Evangelization

Taking the inventory is the start of a larger process of prayerful discernment that helps us recognize the gifts we have and, in an active way, stir up those graces to somehow reveal the movement of the Holy Spirit (personally and communally). As St. Paul reminds us, the gifts within the community differ according to grace (cf. Romans 12:6), and each uniquely responds to the sacred nudging of the Spirit in a different yet life-giving way. The more we discern our own charisms, especially in the context of the needs within the community, the easier it will be to understand how God uses each of us to bring about the Kingdom.

Discernment of our gifts is part of our formation as a people of faith. In his apostolic exhortation, *Christifideles Laici*, Pope St. John Paul II explains, “The fundamental objective of the formation of the lay faithful is an ever-clearer discovery of one’s vocation and the ever-greater willingness to live it so as to fulfill one’s mission” (58). This mission, as Pope Francis articulates, involves being “actively engaged in evangelization” and “proclaiming the love [of Christ] to others” (*Evangelii Gaudium*, 120). As Christians, this is our primary task and responsibility...share the love of Jesus Christ and make disciples (Matthew 28). The charisms we’ve been given allow us to respond to God’s call in a unique way within the community of faith. This response is a process of encounter and sharing that flows from a nurturing and animating love. For missionary disciples, it’s this life-giving and creative love that must be regularly stirred up to engage and ignite burning hearts on the move (cf. Luke 24: 32).

Stirring up the gifts from the Holy Spirit

“I remind you to stir into flame the gift of God that you have...” 1 Timothy 1: 6

The outpouring of grace from the Holy Spirit requires a response from the faithful to stir up the gifts that dwell within. Moments of reflective prayer, dialogue and spiritual direction, encounters with Christ in the Sacraments, study of Sacred Scripture and the teachings of the Church, and social engagement to serve the less fortunate are all opportunities to shake up the charisms that may have settled within us. When we put our faith into action, we become more cognizant of the enriching flow of the Spirit within and through us. God has lavished the riches of his grace upon us (cf. Ephesians 1: 7-8), and when we stir these up, we become aware of the movement of the Holy Spirit in our lives.

Stirring up our gifts from the Holy Spirit leads us to moments of encounter with Christ, who is our source and wellspring. These encounters are ennobling and fulfilling and they connect us back to the community with a sense of purpose and driven action. As missionary disciples, we are called to go out to the peripheries to share the gospel, and this can easily stretch us beyond our comfort level. Pope Francis speaks to this in *Evangelii Gaudium* saying, “Each Christian and every community must discern the path that the Lord points out, but all of us are asked to obey his call to go forth from our own comfort zone in order to reach all the ‘peripheries’ in need of the light of the Gospel” (20). When we rely on the gifts of the Holy Spirit and collaboratively work with others, Christ will touch hearts in and through us. We must find the courage to step into the unknown, trusting that this is God’s project and “his will be done on earth as it is in heaven” (Matthew 6:10).

At times, we, like St. Peter, feel unworthy and ill-equipped for the task. Still, Jesus sees the potential in Peter that Peter cannot see in himself. In the same way, Jesus has made no mistake when he calls you to work for the Kingdom of God. We have an inner dignity that God placed in each of our souls. We long to discover that gift and express our truest identity as a disciple. We may feel unworthy but we are, nonetheless, called by God.

Jesus trained the Apostles through showing them his miracles, teaching the crowds, and conversing with the disciples over a meal. In the process, the Apostles became dear friends with the Lord, knowing and loving him on a personal level. We, too, reflect on the signs of God’s love in our lives, we study the Faith, and we share in the Bread of Life with our parish community. We deepen our love of Jesus with each prayer and each blessing. You might not have noticed, but God has been training you for years.

In preparation for his Ascension, Jesus entrusted to his Apostles his vision of the Kingdom of God. He gave them opportunities to practice the ministries of feeding the hungry, caring for the sick, and sharing the Gospel with others. Christ sent the disciples out two-by-two with the understanding that they would need to encourage each other and work together if they were to be successful evangelizers (See Luke 10:1-5).No one person has all the necessary gifts. God designed us to share our burdens and the joys with one another.

As the fruits of the labor of the Apostles, we have inherited the hope of how the world could be, as well as the sorrow that far too many people have yet to embrace the way of the Lord. Like the disciples, we practice our Faith with the opportunities we have to minister in the parish and with our community. Still, many people lack the confidence that their gift is worth offering when the Church is filled with more talented people.

Working Together

St. Paul traveled the known world, establishing Christian communities wherever he went. Many people were introduced to Christ through him. Many became co-missionaries with Paul. They burned with a zeal to spread the Good News and to please the Lord as they sacrificed for the cause of the Kingdom. Evangelization was, and continues to be, essential to the work of the Church. Pope Francis says, “Evangelization is the task of the Church. The Church, as the agent of evangelization, is more than an organic and hierarchical institution; she is first and foremost a people advancing on its pilgrim way towards God” (*Evangelii Gaudium* [EG], 111). He continues, “Being Church means being God’s people, in accordance with the great plan of his fatherly love. This means that we are to be God’s leaven in the midst of humanity. It means proclaiming and bringing God’s salvation in our world” (EG, 114).



St. Paul taught that all the members of the Church are like members of the Mystical Body of Christ (see 1 Corinthians 12:12-26). With Christ as our Head, we each have a role and function. In as much as we offer our distinct gifts and participate with the mission of the whole Body, we are living out our identity as Church. This is not just the responsibility of the clergy, but of all the people, including the laity. Pope St. Paul VI teaches,

“In virtue of this catholicity each individual part contributes through its special gifts to the good of the other parts of the whole church”... “All men are called to be part of this catholic unity of the people of God which in promoting universal peace presages it” (*Lumen Gentium* [LG], 13).

He continues,

“Upon the laity, therefore, rests the noble duty of working to extend the divine plan of salvation to all men of each epoch and in every land. Consequently, may every opportunity be given them so that, according to their abilities and the needs of the times, they may zealously participate in the saving work of the Church” (LG, 33).

Furthermore, “Even when preoccupied with temporal cares, the laity can and must perform a work of great value for the evangelization of the world” (LG, 35). Finally, the Holy Father says,

“A great many wonderful things are to be hoped for from this familiar dialogue between the laity and their spiritual leaders: in the laity a strengthened sense of personal responsibility; a renewed enthusiasm; a more ready application of their talents to the projects of their spiritual leaders”... In this way, the whole Church, strengthened by each one of its members, may more effectively fulfill its mission for the life of the world” (LG, 37).

Pope Francis adds,

“In virtue of their baptism, all the members of the People of God have become missionary disciples. All the baptized, whatever their position in the Church or their level of instruction in the faith, are agents of evangelization, and it would be insufficient to envisage a plan of evangelization to be carried out by professionals while the rest of the faithful would simply be passive recipients. The new evangelization calls for personal involvement on the part of each of the baptized” (EG, 120)

The Holy Spirit has endowed each of us with gifts that we are called to use to actively build the Church!

Those possessing this grace deeply desire to connect and identify with Jesus and the poor, joyfully exhibiting great simplicity for the benefit of others. They are greatly inspired by Jesus’s preferential option for the poor in the Gospels and allow that to shape their lifestyles.

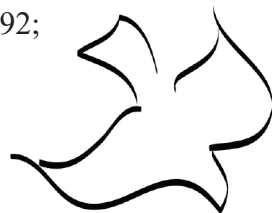

You Are More Gifted Than You Know

On the day of Pentecost, the Apostles received the gift of the Holy Spirit. They radically changed from cowards hiding in the Upper Room to fearless proclaimers to the public, regardless of the threat of imprisonment, torture, or death. In addition, they received the supernatural gift to speak in languages they had never studied (see Acts 2:1-4). These gifts of courage and languages gave them the ability to fulfill the last instruction of Jesus before he ascended into heaven, “Go, therefore, and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the holy Spirit, teaching them to observe all that I have commanded you” (Matthew 28: 19-20a). God not only gave them instructions, but gave them the means to fulfill His plan. Receiving the gift to speak foreign languages reveals and echoes the plan of God and their role in it.

St. Paul lists many spiritual gifts, or “**charisms**” (See Ephesians 4:7-13 and 1 Corinthians 12:1-12). Some of these gifts are natural gifts developed through life experience and personal abilities, such as administration, teaching, or pastoring. Paul sees it as a blessing to offer these gifts to the Lord to be used as He sees fit. All of us have talents and abilities we have nurtured throughout our lives. They have served us well. Now, our abilities can be an offering to the Lord, as well. Other charisms seem to be surprising, such as the ability to speak in tongues, interpret tongues, the gift of knowledge or of prophecy. It is entirely possible and even likely that many of us have hidden gifts or new spiritual gifts that God desires to give us to meet the needs of the times. The gifts that are discovered within our communities of faith may reveal and echo God’s plan and our role in it.



God will not set us up for failure by asking us to participate in something that we cannot accomplish. At the same time, it is not uncommon for God to call us to participate in something of which we have no experience or confidence in our own ability. In so doing, God provides what we, ourselves, could not. This is how the activity of God is recognized. “God chose the weak of the world to shame the strong, so that no human being might boast before God” (1 Corinthians 1: 28b-29). So, expect to be surprised in what God asks you to do, but God will also surprise us by providing us with the gifts to accomplish his will.

The aim of offering our charisms to God is to let our lives be led by the Holy Spirit and allow that same Spirit to form a community of faith. The process of discovering our charisms and how God would like us to use those gifts is called “**discernment**.” As we discover our gifts, both our expected and surprising gifts, the implied plan of God will be revealed. Those gifts were given for a reason. The application of those gifts must be what God is asking us to accomplish. What a joy to be invited to participate in the Divine Providence!

As we offer our gifts to God and discover new charisms of the Spirit through opportunities of ministry in the Church, we will grow in our confidence in God and in identifying ourselves as a true disciple. Our maturing in the Faith through active participation in the work of the Church will, necessarily, lead to a deeper relationship with God and a more fully embraced acceptance of His holy will.

Are You Ready To Get Started?

As Christians, we are a people animated by the Holy Spirit to be on the move, sharing in word and deed, the transformative love of Christ. Each of us has a unique role in the Church. Speaking to this, the Catechism of the Catholic Church says, “So that she can fulfill her mission, the Holy Spirit ‘bestows upon the Church varied hierarchic and charismatic gifts, and in this way directs her.’ ‘Henceforward the Church, endowed with the gifts of her founder and faithfully observing his precepts of charity, humility and self-denial, receives the mission of proclaiming and establishing among all peoples the Kingdom of Christ and of God’” (*Catechism of the Catholic Church*, par. 768). All the baptized have been given a role in this mission. With Christ as the Head of the Mystical Body, and the Holy Spirit to guide us and provide the necessary gifts, each of us are active participants in the Church. The laity, together with the clergy, are called to address the real needs of our time.

By identifying our charisms, the plan and intention of God will be revealed. Then we can collaborate with each other as members of a body, working in unison toward a common goal. Shedding any desire to be independent, our weakness becomes our strength. We become beautifully reliant on God and on each other. What a vision God has given us! What an honor is ours to be called into this One, Holy, Catholic, and Apostolic Church.

As we prayerfully, honestly, and generously take this survey, may God show us how we can please Him. May the Holy Spirit draw us into a closer relationship with Christ and a mature identity as his disciple. May we see more clearly the Divine Plan for His Church. Amen.

The Value of the Assessment to the Participant

- 1. To grow in awareness of your own gifts.
- 2. To become more aware of the variety of ministries, activities, and gifts that are present in the Church.
- 3. To grow in appreciation of the gifts of others.
- 4. To have a sense of the unity of the members of the Church with their variety of gifts as members of the Mystical Body of Christ.
- 5. To name and understand at which stage of the Journey of Faith you are currently and identify the next small step in your development toward becoming a fully engaged Missionary Disciple.
- 6. To consider offering your gifts to a ministry in the parish based on your maturing in faith or the realization of your own gifts.

The Possible Uses of the Results of the Assessment

- 1. To invite participants to explore areas of ministry for which they have no experience with the purpose of becoming aware of hidden talents and surprising spiritual gifts and interests.
- 2. To use the information for spiritual direction and mentoring for the purpose of learning how to recognize and respond to the promptings of the Holy Spirit.
- 3. To help a participant in the discernment process for seeing how to get involved in the parish ministries based on the stages of the Journey of Faith and the needs for specific gifts.
- 4. To look at the overall results of a parish group to identify future needs of the parish in regards to parish ministries and where the Holy Spirit seems to be leading the pastoral plan of the parish.
- 5. For those having difficulty knowing where to get involved, have them meet with the Pastor and let them pray together.

Those possessing this grace easily recognize the revelation of God throughout the world and can articulate truth with great conviction. Their awareness of God’s close presence gives them the keen ability to communicate a message of conversion that stirs hearts to change.
